It is located on the north side of the property the Village purchased in the "original Estero" on Highlands Avenue. As you may recall, the cottage and schoolhouse we have now both originally were moved from this same street. We are in the process of trying to firm up a location to which it can be moved, then will begin to raise the money necessary to move and restore this sweet 27 x 27 home. We will most certainly keep you all informed, as time goes on and the plans unfold. And we'll let you all know how you can help.

We were proud to host the Estero Chamber of Commerce Leadership Class in March, where we provided breakfast and gave them some background information and a tour of both of our buildings. They then went to visit the Alvarez/Smith home before traveling on to other locations for the day.

We'd love to have you come to this ribbon cutting. Then, at 1:00 we will be unveiling the Tamiami Trailblazers exhibit marking the 100th anniversary of their cross-state trek through the Everglades. This exhibit was made possible by partnering with the Southwest Florida Historical Society and by two of our FGCU student volunteers who researched for countless hours – Joe Esckilsen and Kayleigh Oliver. 
Did You Know?

THE QUESTERS members each belong to a local Chapter that meets at least once a month and usually from September through May. State and Provincial Chapters come together to form their State/Provincial Quester organization and are part of the International Quester organization. The focus of chapter meetings is a planned program highlighting a collection, historic story or historic site presented by a Quester member, local collector or other expert. Meetings may take place in a Quester home, public venue, or historical site like a museum. State/provincial meetings focus on a theme in a larger accessible venue, sometimes at a historical venue. The annual Quester International Convention in the spring enhances the experience for members with tours, speakers, and mini lyceums. During these Conventions, tours highlight the convention hosts unique history and historical sites, along with emphasis on local Quester preservation and restoration projects. A virtual Chapter is in the planning.

The River House or The Charles Dauray House

The meeting with Village Manager Steve Sarkozy regarding 8801 Corkscrew Road, known as the River House or as the Charles Dauray House. The village wants to tear it down, we had an independent contractor look it over to determine what it would take to be saved. A construction engineer went in the house to access and noted it needs a new roof, made ADA compliant, improved sewer and water, needs a two land driveway among other issues. It has been determined to demolish the house after historic items ie beams, doors, stained glass windows are removed. Gail Langner went before the Village Council to advise the Historical Society is on board with the home being demolished.

History - Our Story Is Worth Saving



Just like pieces of stained glass or poetry create beautiful art and mosaics, with colors representing a different part of the story, so does the landscape of Southwest Florida show what a special place this is to call home. My mother's amily came originally to Sarasota County in the early 1900s and then

later moved to Naples in 1928. My father's family started in DeLand in the 1890s, eventually opening a boarding house on the East Coast. Their stories have all led to mine — and all of ours.

No famous person ever slept here. It's no Appomattox or Monticello. It was built in 1916 by Joaquin "King" Alvarez and his wife Anna. King came from Spain and Anna from Portugal. They met in 1907 on Mound Key. All of Highlands Avenue was the original Estero. And this particular house ended up being the hub. The Alvarez-Smith family grew a sprawling citrus orchard and sold citrus on the site — a memory of an industry that like others built this state, and plays second fiddle to tourism. Old homes meet new growth every day, especially here in Southwest Florida. But saving those memories of the past, those mosaic tiles are what makes us a special place to live. Alongside the cottage and Estero Schoolhouse that the Estero of Society owns, the Alvarez-Smith House would add pages to the story that is part of all of us here in Estero and throughout Southwest Florida.

It will take a village. More than just the Village of Estero and more than the Estero Historical Society. It will take our community, our mosaic, to come together. Prior to the Alvarez- Smith home coming up, another home and piece of history was lost. Finances and timing were too far gone. However, this is different. If businesses, other nonprofits, and community leaders rally with Estero Historical Society and work with the Village to create a partnership to help fund the move and refurbishment of the Alvarez Smith Home it could inspire future generations to the Englishment of the Alvarez Smith Home it could inspire future generations to the cheapest fix to a problem. Some say it could cost three or four times less to tear down the home than move and restore it. But is that the best use of taxpayer funds? When the dust settles, is a one-time check, cut and spent in less than an hour the highest use of dollars for our community? Is there any benefit to the Village of Estero by tearing the home down? If you ask yourself that, I'm sure you'll agree those questions all lead to the same answer. No.

Wouldn't it be better if the Village utilized what funds they would use to tear down the home to help restore it? With EHS and others — such as Florida Gulf Coast University, businesses, and various Estero Communities — funds could be raised and leveraged for the long-term preservation of the home and perhaps its utilization as a Welcome Center with benefits to the community, tourism, and commerce in perpetuity.

It's up to all of us to preserve our story here in Southwest Florida. When my mom attended Seagate Elementary School, she raised pennies to save Rookery Bay, the gateway to the Ten Thousand Islands and part of billions of dollars in fishing, marine, boating, eco-tourism, and recreation industries over the years. Through the last half century we've come together to save the Wonder Gardens in Bonita Springs, Mound Key, the Naples Cottage, Lover's Key on Fort Myers Beach and so many other amazing treasures that make up our mosaic. Now is the moment to come together again or explain to future generations how we yielded. I'm not a fan of the latter, it's not an option for me at all and I hope it's not an option for you.

Tamiami Trail Blazers Exhibit Opens April 15 at Estero Historical Society



Developed in collaboration with the Southwest Florida Historical Society, the Estero Historical Society will host an exhibit of artifacts on the Tamiami Trail Blazers from April 15 through May 27. The Estero Historical Society is located at 9285 Corkscrew Palms Blvd. in Estero Park, and is open from 1:00 to 4:00 pm every Saturday. Joe Esckilsen, a freshman at Gulf Coast University and

University and volunteer at EHS is coordinating the exhibit.

Who were the Tamiami Trail Blazers? We all owe them a debt of gratitude for the expedition they took in April of 1923 to publicize the need for a cross-state highway through the Everglades. The Tral Blazers consisted of 21 business men and community leaders from the west coast of Florida utilizing one commissary truck, seven Model-T's and an Elcar for transportation as well as an Indian guide and local Everglades expert. They followed unpaved Indian trails to go from Fort Myers to Miami. They thought the trip would take three days, but when they failed to show up on the date announced they were presumed lost or dead. Their disappearance became a national news story.

But after 17 days, when they finally arrived in Miami they were hailed as heroes and their efforts worked! Funding was obtained and a paved road opened through the Everglades four years later.
